

HUM 101 Forms and Ideas in Humanities

This introductory course will provide students instruction in the interdisciplinary analysis and interpretation of meaning in art, music, and literature, and in the understanding of philosophical ideas in their own right and as they influence styles and themes in works of art. (*Pre-requisites:*)
